

Emergency Department Tissue adhesive

What is Tissue adhesive?

This information explains the care of your wound, which has been closed using a tissue adhesive.

What should I do now?

- Please inform the doctor or nurse if you have not yet had a discussion about tetanus immunisation. This must be addressed before you leave;
- Be aware that there will be a scar, but that it will be a few months before you know what it will look like;
- Keep the wound dry. If it becomes wet, gently pat it dry without rubbing.
 Do not use water-proof dressings;
- Avoid picking or removing any of the glue. It will eventually scab and later come away itself;
- Avoid excessive movement at the wound site. Also avoid tight clothing that could rub the wound site;
- Use pain relief as advised by the doctor or nurse who treated you;
- If you are employed in food-handling, you must inform your employer of your injury before returning to work.

Contact your GP if there is:

- Excessive or increasing pain;
- Increasing swelling or spreading redness;
- oozing from the wound;
- The edges of the wound pull apart.
