Synacthen test

Your doctor has referred you for a Synacthen test. This is to see if your adrenal glands are producing enough cortisol. Cortisol is one of the essential steroid hormones to keep you healthy.

What does the test involve?

Over an hour, three samples of bloods will be taken (every 30 minutes).

Following the first sample of blood, a stimulus hormone called Synacthen will be injected into the muscle in your arm. Synacthen is a manufactured hormone that works by stimulating the adrenal glands to produce more cortisol. By measuring the rise in cortisol in the blood, this shows if the adrenal glands are secreting normal amounts of cortisol.

Preparation for the test

If you are on medication such as the contraceptive pill, or take any steroids orally, as nasal drops, inhalers, skin creams or have recently had a joint injection, it is important that you inform us before your appointment.

If you are on hydrocortisone, please do not take any hydrocortisone tablets the evening before and the morning of the appointment.

You may take any other medication as normal on the day of the test.

The test takes an hour from the time of the injection. Please allow at least an hour and half for the appointment. You may wish to bring a book or magazine.
