

Discharge Advice - Elbow (Radial Head/Neck) Fracture

You have sustained a small break / fracture in the radial head or neck – one of the bones in your elbow.

- These fractures almost always heal well with time and light use. No specific treatment is required, therefore routine follow-up is unnecessary.
- You will have been provided with a sling or collar and cuff to help hold your elbow in a comfortable position for a few days.
- You should gradually reduce the use of a sling / collar and cuff as your pain settles and aim to remove the sling completely as soon as you feel able.



Patient Information

Painkillers

You should have been advised about painkillers. We recommend that you take these regularly for the first few days both for your comfort and to enable you to move your elbow. It is important to keep gently moving your elbow, wrist and hand and gradually resume daily activities within the limits of discomfort. This will reduce stiffness and ensure the quickest return to normal function.

- Forcible stretching is unnecessary and is likely to cause pain and delay your recovery.
- Symptoms are usually minor but they may take up to 3-6 weeks to settle.
