Punch biopsy of the cervix

Questions and Answers

What is a biopsy?

A biopsy is a very small piece of tissue that is removed from the cervix quickly and with only a little discomfort. It is not necessary to use a local anaesthetic and most patients are not aware that the biopsy has been taken.

This little piece of tissue is then put into some preserving fluid and sent to the Pathology Department for examination.

Why did I need this biopsy?

If the colposcopist (nurse or doctor) identifies any abnormal areas on the cervix a small biopsy will be taken. This tissue is sent to the pathologist who examines the tissue to see whether the sample is a low grade or a high grade abnormality.

The colposcopist performing the examination can show you your cervix and the area identified as being abnormal on a screen connected to the colposcope and at this time can discuss with you what is happening.

What can I expect after the biopsy?

You may have a small amount of vaginal discharge or bleeding that may last for a few days. You may also experience a little abdominal discomfort for the remainder of the day. You can resume normal activities including sexual activity after 24 hours.

What happens next?

Your consultant receives a report from the pathologist usually within a couple of weeks and will write to you with the results.

If the biopsy does not show any significant abnormality we may be able to discharge you to normal cytology recall (3 yearly)

If the biopsy shows any abnormal changes that may progress towards a pre-cancerous condition we will want to bring you back to the Colposcopy Unit to discuss treatment.
