# Caring for your child at home following a food/drug challenge

After your child has had a food/drug challenge they will have been observed in hospital for a period of time. The length of time depends on how they reacted to the food/drug or whether there has indeed been a reaction.

It is important that on leaving the unit that your child remains under close supervision overnight.

Most reactions are immediate or soon after, eating the food or receiving the drug. Very rarely, a child will experience a delayed reaction and become unwell at home.

If this reaction is mild, a dose of anti-histamine may be enough treatment. The dose of

Cetirizine for your child is .....
